1. Read the passage below and answer the questions that follow. (20 marks)

Leadership has played a vital role since time immemorial. Leadership has been in the past viewed as the art of influencing and winning the support of other human beings. We have become socialized and educated into a system that views leadership within this narrowly defined concept. Leadership has therefore become inadequate to respond to the modern demands in relation to the rapidly changing socio-economic, political, spiritual, cultural, social, traditional and even professional values.

The general tendency is to search for inspiration, capability and effectiveness in our leaders and we become disappointed when we find none forthcoming from the leaders around us. Mortivation, spirit, mutual trust, pride, spiritual strength and faith in the righteousness of the cause are basically the essence of good leadership. It is imperative that a leader is disciplined and mission oriented for moral reasons. The leader needs to be as sensitive as possible to the legitimate needs and expectations of the led and get any mission entrusted to him completed efficiently. A leader is expected to exhibit the highest ethical standards regardless of the task or objective at hand.

There is now an added dimension in our concept of leadership, encompassing the ability to deal with the changing socio-economic, cultural, spiritual and even the political environments in the country as a whole. The new dimensions require the broadening of the leaders' intellectual horizons and the scope of leadership. Leaders must have a legitimate concern for every level and for every contingency. Leadership must therefore be conditioned by our changed environments and relevant political, social, cultural, spiritual and economic considerations.

Leadership roles require changing to become more dynamic so that they can meet the demands of the times. This is because the authority to rule is based on law and the **mantle** of leadership is bestowed upon one by those who are led. A good leadership style entails spiritual righteousness, justice, piety, technical or professional competence, compelling presence, charismatic qualities, confidence of the followers, integrity, honour, bravery and many other qualities. The style of leadership should be appropriate to the faith, the creed, the way of life, the people and the prevailing socio-political and economic contexts. If it is isolated from the economic, religious,

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political or economic context in which is to be exercised and if it is ignorant of the character of those to be led and the purposes for which they are to be led, then the leadership becomes inept, corrupt and self-serving.

Good leadership must conform to the values of society. Effective leadership can only thrive in a happy society. The society stands to profit through the merits of superior leadership qualities. Qualities like independent, decisiveness, initiative, courage, mercy, faith, comprehension, resourcefulness are all necessary to be possessed by a leader in a given society. It is also important for a leader to possess sound moral values in order to rise above the ordinary and see beyond the narrow interests of an immediate world.

No leaders are born. People are born and leaders are made. It is a leader's ability to lead those around him and to share his vision, to share his commitments and to get each one of his followers to actively participate in the nation-building endeavours that makes a good leader.

What I mean is only that I got scent of the unbelievable botch-up our so called leaders had been responsible for down at the Baths. I can't stand these leaders at any price!- I have had enough of such people in my time. They are like goats on a young forest; they do mischief everywhere they go. They stand in a free man's way, whichever way he turns, and what I would like to see is them being exterminated like any other vermin... (*Uproar*.)

PETER STOCKMANN: Mr. Chairman, can we allow such comments to pass?

ASLAKSEN (with his hand on his bell): Doctor Stockmann ...!

DR. 2ND CITIZEN: He doesn't belong here.

3RD CITIZEN: It must be that timber merchant from over at ... (the rest is inaudible).

ASLAKSEN: He had obviously had too much beer. Proceed, Doctor; but please strive to be moderate in your language.

DR. STOCKMANN: Very well, gentlemen, I shall say no more about our leaders. And if anyone imagines, from what I have just said, that my object is to attack these people this evening, he is wrong- absolutely wide off the mark. For I am happily convinced that these parasites – all these venerable relics of a dying age – are most admirably paving the way for their own extinction; they need no doctor's help to hasten their end. Nor is it folk of that kind who constitute the most pressing danger to society. It is not they who are most instrumental in poisoning the sources of our moral life and infecting the soil on which we stand. It is not they who are the most dangerous enemies of truth and freedom in our society.
