Question 1: COMPREHENSION

Read the passage below and answer the questions that follow.

When it comes to earnings, there are three major classifications of incomes: active, passive and portfolio. Active income usually comes from sources such as formal employment or self employment; passive income is that which one earns from leveraging an existing system such as franchising and portfolio income which is earned from investments such as bonds and shares – which may have been bought using savings from active and passive incomes.

Today, passive income sources are vital as a solution to swelling unemployment rates at a time when new income sources cannot match the demand. While Kenya aims to improve the quality of life to its citizenry by 2030, new solutions and policies are needed in order to challenge the traditional income creation methods.
